 APRIL 28, 2011  
 MEETING MINUTES

The regular Board Meeting was called to order at 6:45 by President Frank Spor. Board members in attendance at this meeting included; Maren Ketchum, Karen Hovis, Jahan Sheikholeslami, Ray Fischer, Walt Leis, and Director Ken Pienkos.

AGENDA OF MEETING

AGENDA APPROVED-, (Walt motioned and Ray seconded, unanimous)

RECOGNITION OF NEW BOARD MEMBER

-Dr Ray Fischer was welcomed to the board as our newest member. He has been in attendance at the requisite number of meetings and was elected to the board by acclamation.

MINUTES OF PREVIOUS MEETING

-A typo was changed and the reference to C. Raymond Davis was corrected from "Ray Davis" in the minutes.

MINUTES APPROVED- as per corrections(Jahan motioned , and Maren seconded, unanimous)

PRESIDENTS REPORT

-Frank discussed having looked into an option for a "solar power option" where a contractor designs and installs a PV system using the new Library roof. The power consortium would generate power to the grid and we would be given a "reduced" rate for electricity for a period of about 20 years, after which the Library would own the solar PV system free and clear. Frank has discovered that the normal degradation of a typical PV system is anywhere from ½% to ¾% per year. Ray Fischer offered to look into this option .

The report was not acted upon at this time.

TREASURERS REPORT

-The treasurer was not in attendance, the report was available in the board package in pages 5 and 6

TREASURERS REPORT ACCEPTED-(Walt motioned, and Karen seconded, unanimous)

DIRECTORS REPORT

The report was discussed from the section included in pages 7 through 10 of the Board package.

Ken highlighted several items from his report. These included;

1. The community garden is being completed in cooperation with the Chester County Intermediate Unit, 21<sup>st</sup> Century Learners, and the Chester County Food Bank.
2. The soil for the garden raised beds has been delivered and will be placed in the wood frame raised beds when they are completed

3. Circulation numbers for the library have been improving year to date. In fact, March 2011 was the all time highest circulation for that month.
4. The READ dogs had been selected for the Mayor's Citizen Recognition Award.
5. The ANNUAL APPEAL letters have been printed and will be sent out within the next few weeks. Additional names for the list are being sought by referrals.
6. Discussions regarding the required ternary hydraulics inspection and maintenance of the library elevator system. This inspection, required by PA-L&I, was missed by the state in 2010. The inspection will incur an additional \$400 fee unanticipated.
7. The Oxford Area Foundation has gifted the OPL with 22 new flat panel computer monitors as well as some other new computer equipment,

DIRECTORS REPORT ACCEPTED –(Jahan motioned and Ray seconded, unanimous)

#### BUILDING AND GROUNDS REPORT

1. Todd and C Raymond Davis presented several cost savings ideas. One of these was considered to be presented to the Board. That one being the substitution of a polished concrete “terrazzo” flooring instead of blue stone.
2. It appears, from these discussions that we have probably fine tuned these cost savings and, with the addition of the above we are reflecting as many cost savings as possible in our plans.
3. There are some needs for immediate repairs and building maintenance resulting from water damage that was “wicked” onto the building by close growing shrubbery and plant material. Windows are in need of repairs and replacement because they are rapidly rotting from the water.

MOTION-To set a 12K limit to seek out contractors to do the required repairs. Further a 900 dollar amount will be needed for regarding and sodding.

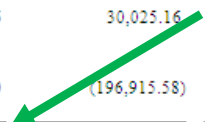

**Circulation** statistics are on the rise for the second consecutive month. Our efforts to re-organize the children's areas, follow holds requests more closely, and purchase the most demand items is helping. With declining new materials budgets our purchase skills, marketing displays, and best efforts are creating new and creative opportunities to provide customer services.

**Personnel:** Staff compliance with the online customer service competency courses is going well and return tests and documentation of the program is building staff personnel records.

**Programs:** Our ongoing Chess, Knitting, and READ programs are stable and will continue throughout the summer months in addition to the many Summer Reading Club programs.

The READ dogs have been selected for the Mayor's Citizen Recognition Award this year for service to the community. There were very nice articles in the Chester County Press and the Daily Local about the Mayor's Awards.

Outreach to our OASD librarians is in place, school presentations are scheduled and registration will begin June 13<sup>th</sup>. Leanne and Nancy have story times, crafts and supplies ready to go.

**Our partnerships** are solid with the Chester County Intermediate Unit 21<sup>st</sup> Century Learners and the Chester County Food Bank for the *raised bed garden project*. This promises to be a summer of community evolvment and library-centered vitality in Oxford.

Our contact coordinators are Bill Rose & Dana Vannicola; Student Support Specialists, Chester County Intermediate Unit, Migrant Education - Oxford Stars After-School Program. Mary Kay Peterson, Chester County Food Bank.

**Volunteer Program:** Barb Palmer has initiated three new volunteers to assist on regular schedules with library programs, shelving, paged book retrieval, bulletin boards, capital campaign material planning, and social networking outreach. Our corps is now about ten regular workers. We hope the "Friends of the Oxford Library" will reach out to recruit and include them in bigger strategies. The Friends are planning an outreach and organizational meeting for Friday June 17<sup>th</sup> at 1 pm @ the library.

is an example of that and was recognized as one of this year's recipients. The Ministerium is comprised of clergy from the Oxford area. Helping to organize the annual CROP Walk and the Martin Luther King, Jr. Day of Service are two duties handled each year by the Ministerium. Pastor Dan Bodine of the Community of Love Lutheran Church and Pastor Jesse Johnson of the Media Mennonite Church accepted the award on behalf of the Ministerium.

For the first time ever, Mayor Henry nominated an organization for this award, suggesting the Oxford Area Senior Center. Initially, the senior center started out as a Chester County Department of Aging "Meals Together" Program that provided food for low-income Oxford Borough senior citizens. It became a certified non-profit corporation in 1987, the same year that it was accredited as a senior center. The Oxford Presbyterian Church housed the senior center until the devastating fire on Memorial Day weekend in 1989. From there, the senior center moved on to the Oxford United Methodist Church until it purchased the former "Research Club" on Locust Street in 1999. That is where the senior center still serves more than 1,500 senior citizens annually.

While the Mayor's Citizen Recognition Awards spotlighted some of the finer attributes of the town and its citizens, there was also ample evidence at Monday

allow youngsters to improve their literacy skills by reading to specially trained dogs.

Henry pointed out that Barbara Hoffman and her dog "Libby" have been volunteering at the Oxford Public Library for nearly 3 years. The program has grown steadily in popularity since then, with other caring pet owners and their certified dogs allowing children to read to the therapy animals. Research has shown that children with low self-esteem are often more willing to interact with an animal than another person. Children typically find reading less intimidating and more fun if they read to therapy dogs.

When Hoffman accepted the award on behalf of all the program participants, she said that the R.E.A.D. team visits schools, senior centers, and Veterans Affairs hospitals, and they now receive more requests to make appearances than what they can easily accommodate.

"We are all over the place, but we do need more dogs and more people," she said. Anyone who is interested and thinks that his or her dog is a candidate to be a therapy dog should contact Ken Pienkos, Oxford Public Library Director, for information about how to proceed with the training. Artemis Anderson has been a productive volunteer with the Salvation Army in Oxford for more than 20 years. As a volunteer, she has helped bring assistance to struggling families in Oxford and the surrounding communities. She collected toys for the "Angel Trees" that brightened the holidays for children and families. She has organized
